Lessons from the Parable

1. The Son comes, not only to be received by words, but also to receive fruits

“A good tree cannot bear bad fruit, nor can a bad tree bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire”

Matthew 7:18-19

2. The rejection of God's fair judgment will never abolish His justice

“Therefore what will the owner of the vineyard do to them? He will come and destroy those vinedressers and give the vineyard to others. And when they heard it they said, ‘Certainly not!’”

Luke 20:15-16

3. The Cornerstone: Falling on Him or Him falling on some

4. God's love is shown in His patience and longsuffering

“...when once the Divine longsuffering waited in the days of Noah, while the ark was being prepared, in which a few, that is, eight souls, were saved through water”

1 Peter 3:20

5. God's patience is active and always at work

6. God's patience is to be appreciated through our repentance
