What scripture says about discipline

- * Heb. 12:1-11

- * 1 Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, 2 looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. 3 For consider Him who endured such hostility from sinners against Himself, lest you become weary and discouraged in your souls. 4 You have not yet resisted to bloodshed, striving against sin. 5 And you have forgotten the exhortation which speaks to you as to sons:

What scripture says about discipline

- * “My son, do not despise the chastening of the Lord, Nor be discouraged when you are rebuked by Him; 6 For whom the Lord loves He chastens, And scourges every son whom He receives.”
- * If you endure chastening, God deals with you as with sons; for what son is there whom a father does not chasten? 8 But if you are without chastening, of which all have become partakers, then you are illegitimate and not sons. 9 Furthermore, we have had human fathers who corrected us, and we paid them respect. Shall we not much more readily be in subjection to the Father of spirits and live? 10 For they indeed for a few days chastened us as seemed best to them, but He for our profit, that we may be partakers of His holiness. 11 Now no chastening seems to be joyful for the present, but painful; nevertheless, afterward it yields the peaceable fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it.

Characteristics of Biblical discipline

1. To deter destruction

- * “You have not yet resisted to bloodshed, striving against sin.”
(Heb. 12:4)
- * Discipline always seeks the child’s best interest

Characteristics of Biblical discipline

2. Via action and words

- * “And you have forgotten the exhortation which speaks to you as to sons: “My son, do not despise the chastening of the Lord, Nor be discouraged when you are rebuked by Him...” (Heb. 12:5)
- * Yasar = discipline (translated chastening)
- * Yakach = rebuke

Characteristics of Biblical discipline

3. Motivated by love

- * **“For whom the Lord loves He chastens,**
And scourges every son whom He
receives.” 7 If you endure chastening, God
deals with you as with sons; for what son is
there whom a father does not chasten? 8
But if you are without chastening, of which
all have become partakers, then you are
illegitimate and not sons.

Characteristics of Biblical discipline

- 4. Goal is to teach obedience
- 5. Exchange short-term pain for long-term gain

Discipline is worth the effort

- * Ex: Eli the priest
 - * Problem: his love never translated into discipline
